Upon his military retirement Rodney and his wife Robin moved to Colorado where he began teaching in a low socio-economic high school in rural Colorado. In 2007, Rodney was named the Colorado Teacher of the Year by the Troops to Teachers Program of the State. Rodney and his wife began raising cows by taking in a neighbor's replacement heifers and wintering them on their place. This began the move to building their ranch by buying and leasing property that came available around them, while building their own herd of cows. Today, with the help of many regenerative agriculture seminars, the mentorship of fellow ranchers, the Natural Resource Conservations Service, their own sons Range Land Education with the University of Wyoming and finally the opportunity to go to school at Colorado State University they have built a small sustainable cow/calf operation.

They direct market most of their calves to local consumers that are looking for ranch raised custom beef. The ranch is set up into a rotational grazing system that experiments with various grazing cell systems throughout the ranch. Their main goal is to reestablish native grasslands by regenerating former farm fields into productive grazing lands for livestock and wildlife. One of their main projects is to reestablish grasslands within the pinon/juniper ecosystems that have taken over the canyon/arroyo breaks. 🥢





Colorado Plateau Science and Management Forum + Colorado Section of the Society for Range Management 2021 Meeting

t's not too late to register for the 2021 Annual Meeting!

Please join us at the 2021 Annual Meeting for the CO Section of the Society for Range Management in Grand Junction, CO Oct 6-7th.

This year, we'll have a focus on rangeland restoration, and adapting to aridification. Partnering with the Colorado Plateau Science and Management Forum, we've been able to broaden the expertise and bridge memberships. We hope for a rich environment for conversation, community building and learning for stewards, land managers, students and ranchers.

The workshop kicks off with a half-day field tour in the surrounding Grand Junction area, where we will have the opportunity to tour an innovative restoration project with CPW's Danielle Bilyeu Johnson. We then will tour nearby sites with BLM ecologist Nikki Grant-Hoffman and learn from recent research that looked at long-term restoration outcomes. Finally, we will visit a site impacted by drought and learn from each other on potential contributing factors, and brainstorm restoration methods. A meet-and-greet happy hour/ open house will follow the tour. The CSSRM Business meeting will take place immediately following the meet and greet in the same venue.

The all-day workshop on Oct 7th will dive deeper into the themes of aridification and restoration kicked off on the tour. The day will be structured around several keynote presentations and break-out discussion sessions. Attendees will leave with applicable knowledge of how aridification impacts lands they manage, more tools in the toolbox for responding. Expect a workshop that will challenge participants to think outside the box, revisit their assumptions and come away with relevant information that can inform their own land management.

COVID-19 remains a concern we have taken precautions consistent with guidance from the CDA and CSU. Learn more here, and we welcome you to join us Oct. 6-7th, 2021.

Camp Rocky 2021

was held on July 11-16 at the Rocky Mountain Mennonite Camp near Divide, CO. The attendance this year was low due to last year's cancellation. The decision was made to proceed with the camp to prevent back-to-back cancellations. This year's curriculum consisted of four major disciplines: Range Management, Soil and Water Conservation, Forest Management and Wildlife Management. The range management group instructors were Dan Nosal, Josh Tashiro and Ben Berlinger, all of whom represented the Colorado Section SRM (CSSRM).

Camp Rocky is Colorado's premier outdoor learning experience for high school students who want to learn more about and gain a better appreciation of rangelands and the natural resources of Colorado. This youth educational event sponsored by the Colorado Association of Conservation Districts, (CACD) with the help of other natural resource conservation partners.

During the week, the students are engaged in various learning activities associated with their respective disciplines. At the end of the week students were involved in field work associated with the various disciplines. The **range management group** installed portable electric fencing and got hands-on experience with fencing designed to facilitate prescribed grazing management. Additional camper activities throughout the week included volleyball games, hiking, group challenges, nightly natural resource presentations, and a talent show!

2021 FFA Range Judging and Plant Identification Events

Agriculture teachers throughout Colorado are planning a full slate of FFA range judging events this fall. The schedule is as follows:

FFA range judging involves the students in judging the condition of two ecological sites. Several attributes are determined by the students including ecological site name, plant composition, range condition class, vegetation basal and litter cover, suggested stocking rate, apparent rangeland trend, and recommended best management practices.

The CO Section of the Society for Range Management (CSSRM) will be facilitating these educational events for our FFA youth throughout Colorado. FFA team plaques will be award to the high scoring teams and the CSSRM will recognize individual high scoring students for both plant ID and range judging scores. CSSRM will select our High School Youth Forum (HSYF) delegates to the Albuquerque 2022 annual meeting from the top achieving Ag students at the state FFA range judging event.

Sponsors will be the hosting FFA Chapters and the many eastern Colorado conservation districts provide financial and clerical support. Due to the generosity of the sponsors a registration fee is not anticipated. Light breakfast and lunch will be provided. The necessary social safety precautions will be followed as directed by local health officials at all of these events.

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Western Colorado High School Teachers Workshop

Range Management Teachers Workshops Held in Western Colorado

The CSSRM Youth Activities Committee reached out to select Agriculture teachers in western Colorado; Jay Whaley and Reece Melton in Oak Creek at Southern Routt County (SOROCO) high school and Mariah Klingler at Ignacio high school. Jay Whaley had for several year been teaching range management in his classroom which made him a key player in the partnership. Both Ag teachers/FFA advisors agreed to host a range management teachers workshop/field day in their area.

The northwest CO teachers workshop/field day at Oak Creek was held July 20. Baili Foster, CSSRM member and NRCS Soil Conservationist Steamboat Springs, assisted Jay Whaley to lead the program. There were eleven participants at Oak Creek. By all accounts the workshop was a huge success!

The southwest CO workshop/field day at Ignacio took place on August 2 and was facilitated by Mariah Klingler, Ag teacher at Ignacio and Kathleen Delzell, CSSRM member, Pagosa Springs. CSSRM members Monica Klinger, Collbran, CO and Ben Berlinger, La Junta, CO facilitated the instruction. There were thirteen participants including four Ag teachers along with range management professionals from the Southern Ute reservation and NRCS.

The workshop goal was to generate interest and excitement in implementing range judging CDE's and range management curriculum in their classrooms. These workshops emphasized how to accomplish that goal at the high school level based on the following objectives:

- Develop an understanding of the significance of well managed rangelands and the benefits to humans that come from healthy rangeland ecosystems
- Become familiar with how to facilitate FFA
 Range Judging Career Development Events
 (CDE's) and lead agriculture students and 4-H
 clubs in rangeland science primarily through the
 use of the reference Range and Pasture
 Management: A Source Unit for Colorado
 Teachers
- Understand plant structure, palatability, and responses to grazing
- Practice plant identification skills and learn important plant characteristics for western Colorado range plants and pressing and mounting specimens
- Understand Ecological Site Descriptions (ESD's) and how they fit into range management
- Practice conducting FFA range judging and plant identification CDE's

The project received grants from the CSSRM and an Education Outreach Workshop grant from the Colorado Association of Conservation Districts (CACD). The Routt County, Pine River and Mancos Conservation Districts co-sponsored the workshops to manage the funding from the grants. Based on the successful outcomes of these two workshops CSSRM anticipates this education outreach to continue in other locations, reaching teachers throughout parts of western Colorado, and involving more students in range management curriculum in agriculture programs and FFA range judging CDE's.
